In the past, we managed with just one additional space for our Sunday kids class, which was only about 8' x 15'-a challenge when over 20 individuals, including parents and little ones, would gather in that small area. The addition of these two extra rooms is a true blessing, allowing us to expand our kids' ministry and train more teachers who are eager to serve in our programs.
